

Provost's Report to VCU Faculty Senate -- Nov. 1, 2022

In September, <u>VCU was named among the most innovative universities in the country by U.S. News & World Report</u>.

Here are just a few ways we are being recognized for **innovation**:

VCU named as APLU 2022 Degree Completion Award Finalist

The annual award recognizes institutions that employ innovative approaches to improve degree completion while ensuring educational quality. VCU was recognized for establishing a culture where "student success is everyone's job." The three driving factors of this culture change have been affordability, curricular redesign and faculty engagement. Other institutions named finalists for the award are Florida Atlantic University, the University of South Alabama and the University of Texas at San Antonio. The award winner will be announced at the APLU Annual Meeting, Nov. 6-8 in Denver.

VCU awarded \$2M grant to expand first-generation student center

The five-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education will support the expansion of the You First at VCU First-Generation Student Success and Research Center and will increase the university's capacity to support Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) students through culturally competent student programming, student support and engagement, and faculty development and research. The DOE grant will also allow an expanded VCU You First Center to increase inclusive research activity that is accurately reflective of the diversity and intersecting identities of AAPI students.

Celebrating VCU faculty

Nao Hagiwara, Ph.D., associate professor in the Department of Psychology, has received a \$2.4 million grant from the National Institution of Nursing Research (part of NIH) to co-lead a study on racial disparities in surgical pain. Dr. Hagiwara's co-PI is Peter Mende-Siedlecki, Ph.D., associate professor in the Department of Psychological and Brain Sciences at the University of Delaware. Additional researchers involved in the study are Shawn Jones, Ph.D., assistant professor in the Department of Psychology; Emily Rivet, M.D., associate professor in the School of Medicine; Amelia Grover, M.D., professor in the Department of Surgery's Division of Surgical Oncology; Brian Eiler, Ph.D., assistant professor of psychology, at Davidson College; and Lindsay Bryant, a community health educator in Richmond.

Samy El-Shall, Ph.D., professor and the Mary Eugenia Kapp Endowed Chair in Chemistry in the College of Humanities and Sciences has been appointed as a program director of the Chemical Structure, Dynamics and Mechanisms Program in the Division of Chemistry at the National Science Foundation. As a program director he will be responsible for managing the evaluation process of research proposals submitted in the specific program and to make recommendations for funding the top selected proposals, as well as to evaluate the progress made of all the funded projects. The program director can also create new funding opportunities in emerging areas in chemistry. He will return to VCU when his term ends.

The Research Institute for Social Equity (RISE) in the L. Douglas Wilder School of Government and Public Affairs has received \$3 million in state funding from Virginia to expand racial and social equity research, academic scholarship and public engagement. The two-year funding enables RISE to expand its research across many policy issues affecting social justice reform across the United States to promote education, economic security and development on behalf of all Americans. Nakeina E. Douglas-Glenn, Ph.D., associate professor in the Wilder School, is the director of RISE.

Important initiatives in progress

Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP)

In an Oct. 17 message to faculty, staff and students, four (4) topic proposals for the university's next QEP were announced and public comment on the proposals was solicited. The topic proposals, which were selected by the QEP Planning and Development Committee, identify projects that explicitly connect VCU students to life-changing mentored experiences. The four proposals advanced as finalists for further review are:

- Amplifying Transformative Work-Based Learning Experiences at VCU
- Hybrid and Online Experiential Learning: Level the Playing Field

- Scaling Undergraduate Research at VCU: Equitable Engagement in Transformative Learning
- Transformative Mentorship and Research Training with Undergraduate Students Underrepresented in the Sciences

The public comment period closed on Oct. 28 after receiving more than 100 responses. Results are being compiled for a second round proposal review. A final topic announcement is anticipated in December 2022.
